



VMI Parade to Honor Augusta

1995 Augusta Alumni Reunion Set for First Weekend in May

The annual Augusta Military Academy Alumni Reunion will be kicked off on Friday, May 5 with a late afternoon parade at VMI in Lexington, *alma mater* of General Charles S. Roller, Jr. The buildings at VMI were the architectural models for AMA's Big Barracks, and the 20th Century ideals of AMA were formed and honed here.

On Saturday, May 6, the annual AMA Alumni Association membership meeting will be held at the Holiday Inn Golf and Conference Center in Staunton with a Board of Directors meeting to follow. Founder's Day ceremonies will be observed Saturday afternoon at the Old Stone Church cemetery followed by a tour of the AMA campus.

Saturday night banquet

The annual dinner/dance will be held Saturday night at the Holiday Inn where there will be individual introductions by class, awards and an auction. A hospitality room will be open on both Friday and Saturday nights as well as Thursday from 5:30 until 10 PM for "Early Birds".

Alumni Association President **Gary Nicholson, '70**, said that "a special effort is being made to get the fellows back for this reunion who are marking a special anniversary of their graduation from Augusta." The Classes of 1935, 1945, 1955, 1965 and 1975 will have special honors at the 1995 Reunion as will all Augusta World War II veterans.

Tommy Simmons, '53, who is making arrangements for the reunion, said that "there are many interesting things to see and do in Lexington. The Marshall Museum at VMI has one of the most interesting World War II exhibits in the country." Next to the VMI campus is Washington and Lee where the office of General Robert E. Lee is left as it was when he died in 1870. Stonewall Jackson's home and his tomb also are in the historic town.

Golf and tennis available

The Holiday Inn can arrange for rounds of golf at the Country Club of Staunton. Tennis facilities also are available. A ladies program on Saturday will feature shopping, lunch and possible tours.

Mal Livick and **Linda Roller Livick** are expected to address the Founder's Day ceremonies at the Old Stone Church. In spite of the uncertainty about the future of the AMA buildings and grounds, it's anticipated that alumni will be able to walk to stoops and visit their old rooms once more.

The specific schedule for the Reunion will be found on page 9. A registration form is on page 11. Registrations should be received no later than Thursday, April 22.
