Reunion honors WW II Vets

The Old Soldiers came back on the 50th Anniversary of VE Day. Augusta men who were soldiers, sailors, marines, airmen and coast guardsmen in the Great World War II. AMA alumni from the Classes of 1919 forward were on hand to salute Augusta's World War II heroes during the annual AMA Reunion in Staunton the first weekend in May.

At the Saturday night banquet, the Honor Roll of AMA cadets who died in World War II was read. WWII veterans in attendance paid tribute to the Augusta men who did not come home. 53 Augusta alumni lost their lives in the War. (See page 11)

The reunion weekend began under threatening skies at Lexington where the VMI Corps of Cadets honored AMA at a late afternoon dress parade. On Saturday afternoon, the sun shone on Founder's Day ceremonies in the Old Stone Church Cemetery where **Mal and Linda Roller Livick** remembered AMA's founder, **Professor Charles S. Roller**, and his sons, **Colonel Tom Roller** and **General Charles S. Roller, Jr.**
