



1996 reunion honors veterans

Augusta Military Academy's alumni honored their fellow cadets, who wore America's military uniforms during post-World War II conflicts, during the 1996 AMA Alumni Reunion at the Holiday Inn Golf and Conference Center in Staunton.

The largest alumni turnout in many years saw a musical pageant in tribute to AMA alumni who served during the Korean and Vietnam Wars, and Desert Storm. Cadets who served during those conflicts led the salute: **Clyde Ramsey, '49**, the Korean War; **Alex Wattay, '53**, the Vietnam War; and **Steve Trent, '70**, Desert Storm.

Founder's Day

Founder's Day was celebrated once more at the Old Stone Church Cemetery. **Linda Roller Livick**, granddaughter of **General Roller**, and wife of **Colonel Mal Livick**, led the ceremonies.

Echo taps sounded across the church grounds, followed by a single cannon salute, after AMA Chaplain **Bill Gray, '37**, read the names of Augusta alumni who had passed away since the 1995 reunion. An alumni color guard stood by.

Many alumni visited the school buildings and grounds, but concerns about the condition of the buildings kept cadets from climbing the tower to visit their old rooms. A new American flag, presented to the school's owners by the Alumni Association, flew from the tower pole.

Enormous turnout creates nice problems

The big turnout created some difficulties which **Gary Nicholson, '70**, Alumni Association President, said were "nice problems to have." So many people turned up for the Friday night dinner at the Country Club of Staunton that some two dozen could not be served. "We will be sure we have enough seats next year," said Nicholson.

Classes from 1935 through 1983 were represented, with a great turnout by the Class of 1971 for their 25th Anniversary. Several faculty members attended functions, including **Mal Livick**, **Will Parkins, '35**, **Bob Hart**, **Tim Mannasmith**, and **Joe Josephson**.

Elections held

Alumni Association Officers were re-elected for a one year term: President **Gary Nicholson, '70**; Vice President **Bob Bradford, '50**; Secretary **Clyde Ramsey, '49**; Treasurer **Ed Click, '50**; and Chaplain **Bill Gray, '37**. Four new Board members also were elected: **Garry Granger, '71**, V.P. **Leavel, '39**, **Alex Wattay, '53**, and **Rod Willey, '51**. Both Leavel and Willey previously served on the board.

A conference room at the Shenandoah Valley Regional Airport was dedicated to **Jack Manch, '38**. Manch was one of the Doolittle raiders who bombed Tokyo in World War II. He died in 1958, as he struggled to keep his crippled plane from striking houses on the ground, near Las Vegas.
