Contributions drive continues

Good response to fund request

The response has been good from AMA alumni and friends who have been asked to step up their contributions in support of the new AMA Alumni House and Museum, according to **Goodloe Saunders, '57**, President of the AMA Alumni Association.

"We are very grateful to our loyal friends who answered the call," said Saunders. "We now have more than 40 members of the President's Council, composed of those who have donated or pledged at least \$1,000 to the renovation of the old Roller-Robinson house. We know that not everyone can give \$1,000, and we are quite pleased with the number of folks who have bought paver bricks or who have simply written checks for what they can afford."

Work on the house continues unabated. (story on page 17) There have been 2 unforeseen expenses: the county required installation of an expensive sprinkler system, and the owners of AMA required the house to be separated from the Mess Hall which gave us 2 more rooms than were in the original plans.

While work on the interior and exterior of the house should be completed in time for Reunion 2000, it will be some time after that before the museum will have its exhibits ready for viewing. "It will be a work in progress at the time of the reunion," says **Duke Fancher**, '58, new Chairman of the Museum Committee.

Saunders said he hopes that there will not be a slowdown in contributions. "We still need money and will until the house is completed and the offices and all the exhibits are complete. It's a new year and a new millennium, and we want to have the house all paid for when we get to the reunion in May."

A list of current President's Council members is on page 11. Those who have contributed or pledged at least \$1,000 will have a pre-ribbon-cutting tour of the AMA Alumni House and Museum at the reunion, will attend a special reception at White Hall, are receiving periodic reports on the renovation, and will have special ribbons on their reunion registration badges.

A second program which is raising money for the house is the brick paver project. Specially engraved bricks will be used in conjunction with the reconstruction of the walkway leading from the front of the Roller-Robinson House toward the front gate. AMA alumni and friends may purchase these bricks to honor a living person, to commemorate someone who has gone before, or to honor a team, teachers, roommates, and others important to their lives. An order form is on page 31 and samples of bricks already purchased are on pages 32 and 34.



1942


