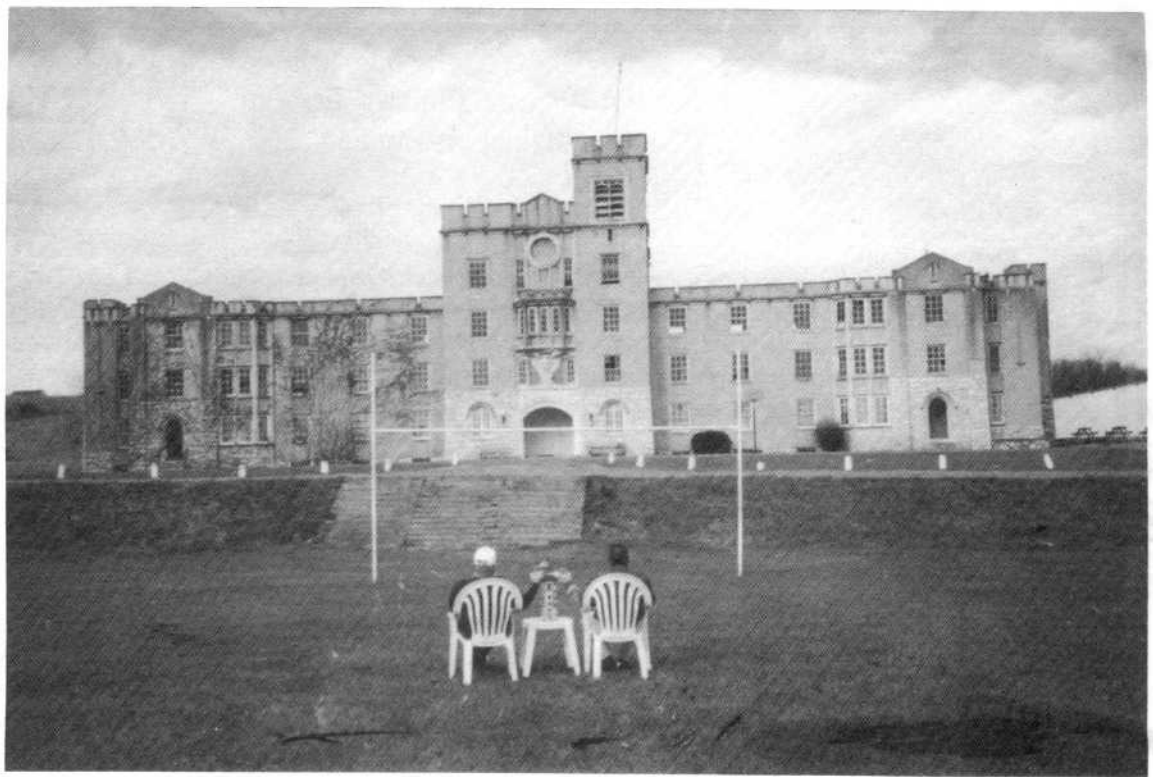

On page 31, **Lieutenant Colonel Todd Livick, '81**, describes a letter writing campaign for Army personnel.

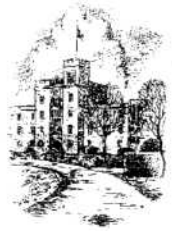
On pages 35 and 65, **Pete Schissel, '75**, has a way to raise the morale of service guys and gals who are in the States being deployed or redeployed.

Julian Quarles was in Florida for Christmas and came back home to Harrisonburg after his 88th birthday in January. [JMQR@aol.com]

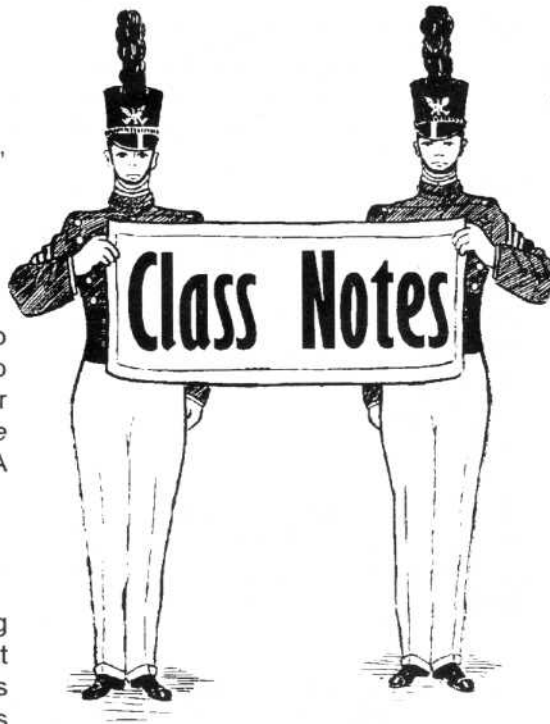
