



"Forgotten heroes, forgotten wars" – the theme for Reunion 2006 in April

Reunion 2006 will honor all Augusta Military Academy alumni who were in the uniform of their country during the Korean and Vietnam Wars. The Korean War, "sandwiched" between World War Two and Vietnam, is sadly forgotten by later generations, but never by those who served then. And the Vietnam veterans were never treated as the heroes they were when they came home from that controversial and divisive war.

In addition to saluting vets from these conflicts, the Honor Classes will be recognized: 1936, 1946, 1956, 1961, 1966, 1971, 1976 and 1981. The social events are plentiful and well conceived: a Thursday night reception at the Staunton Country Club, the Friday night Awards Banquet, a special luncheon in the AMA Gymnasium where our veterans will be honored, and the Saturday night barbecue and dance. In addition, a luxury motor coach will take reunion goers to President Madison's country in Orange County. And there will be golf and tennis and a sporting clay shoot if enough people sign up.

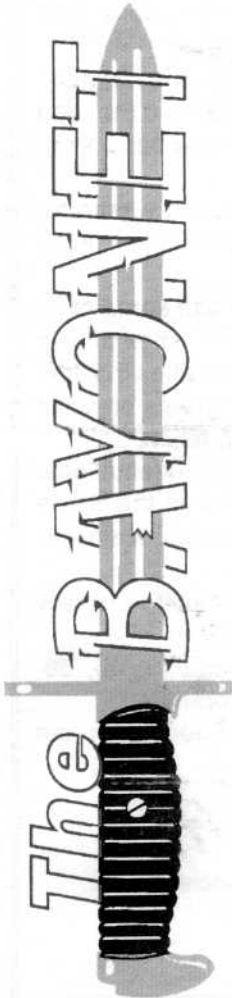

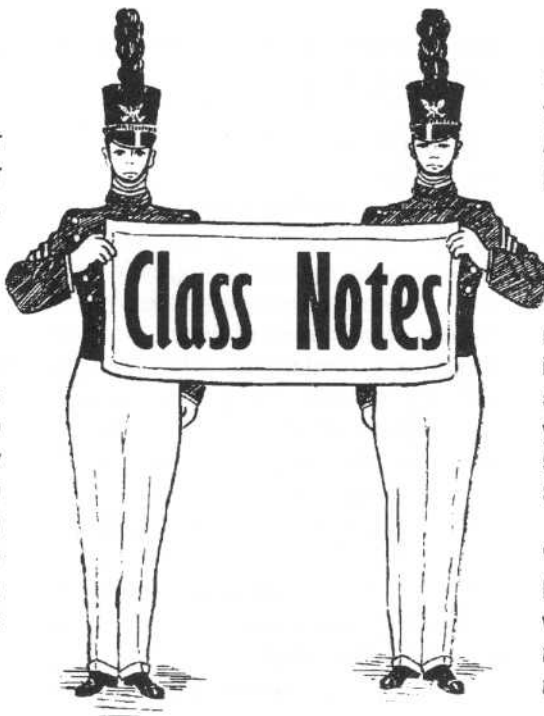
