

Roller's textbook found in collection



and pieces donated to the AMA Museum, one finds an unexpected treasure. Such was the case in early June when a nondescript little volume turned up.




It was a typical pocket book of the mid-to-late 1800s: leather-bound with black pebbled covers, red spine and corners and title embossed in gold letters. The title and author both caught my eye: "Comoediae - T. Macci Playti." What would a book of comedies by Plautus, ancient Rome's best-

doing among copies of "The Recall," photographs from the turn of the century and other memorabilia? And in Latin, no less?

The answer, and a bit of excitement, came on closer examination. There were voluminous Latin grammar notes and word translations in pencil on the inside pages and flyleaf; there was also a name and note on the inside front cover: "Chas. S. Roller, University of VA, 186o."

Since Professor Roller spoke, read and wrote Latin, being an "educated gentleman" in the antebellum sense of the



term, he would have had books in the language. And since he taught Latin in the earliest incarnations of AMA, his use of Plautus - who died in 185 B.C.E. and wrote in the straightforward, clear Latin of the Republic - would make sense.

The date, however, creates another mystery. "Comoediae" was published in 1881 according to the title page, so the inside front cover date of 1860 is anachronistic. Either it was added to what Professor Roller thought was an earlier edition of the work, or it was part of a "name and pedigree" notation still occasionally seen among academics, or it was added in error or by another, which is doubtful. In the archives there are enough examples of Charles S. Roller's

handwriting to determine that it was, in fact, his hand.

This, too, is an example of what happens during processing of items in the AMA Museum collection. One runs across an item that is more than a hundred years old,

seemingly out of place, odd. But with a little study and thought it tells a story about its times, its use, and most importantly, a bit about its owner. It this case, it says that Professor Roller had a bit of trouble conjugating the genitive case.


In Memoriam Jim Hash '72
