



May 1-2 reunion will honor AMA's teachers

Search continues for "lost" faculty members

The 1998 AMA Alumni Reunion will salute Augusta's teachers, that dedicated group of men and women who gave AMA its vaunted position in each alumni heart.

Planned for the first 2 days in May at the Holiday Inn Golf and Conference Center in Staunton, the annual reunion will bring together cadets and faculty in a weekend devoted to renewing old friendships and fomenting new ones. **Hap Starr, '51**, is organizing the faculty tribute and will lead the Saturday night banquet program recognizing AMA faculty and staff members from past generations of Augusta men. Reunion schedule announced

Tommy Simmons, '53, Chairman of the Reunion, announced that there will be an informal dinner on Friday evening, May 1 and the banquet and dance on Saturday night, May 2. The Classes of 1938, 1948, 1958, 1968, 1973 and 1978 will be recognized at the banquet. The AMA Legacy Scholarship winners also will be announced on Saturday night. "The hospitality suite will be open Thursday evening for the early birds and will be open through the day and evenings on Friday and Saturday." The annual Founder's Day ceremonies will take place Saturday at 3 PM at the Old Stone Church Cemetery. A tour of the campus will follow if that can be arranged with the owners of the school.

AMA Alumni President **Goodloe Saunders** announced that the board and annual membership meetings will begin at 9 AM Saturday, an hour earlier than is customary. "We have several matters of importance to discuss, including our major gifts and investment programs, and we don't want to cut anyone short." Ad Astra members will have breakfast at 7:30 AM on Saturday. All functions, except Founder's Day and the campus tour, will be held at the Holiday Inn.

1940

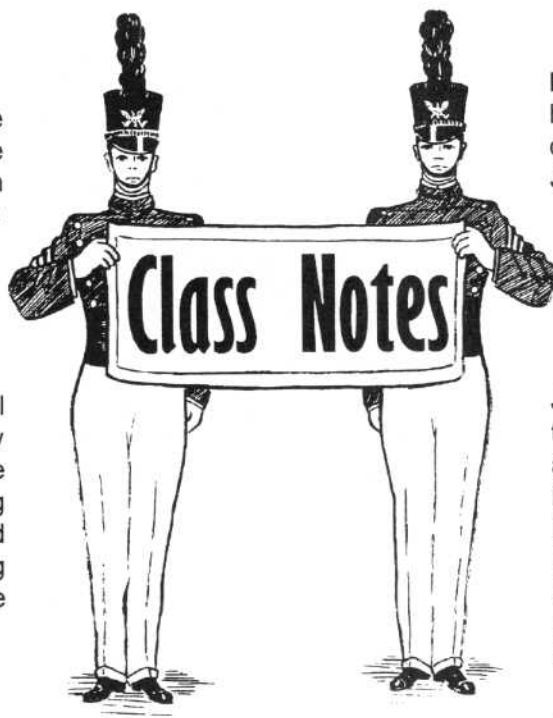
