



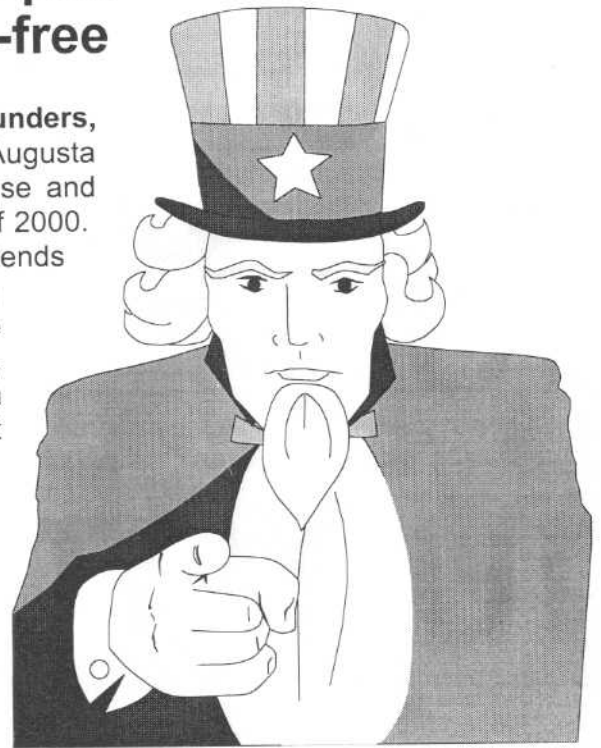
I NEED YOU!

Friends needed to open Alumni House debt-free

AMA Alumni President **Goodloe Saunders, '57**, has asked alumni and friends of Augusta to assure that the AMA Alumni House and Museum will open debt-free in May of 2000. He has challenged 150 alumni and friends to contribute at least \$1,000 each toward renovating and restoring the circa 1870 Roller-Robinson House, located in the center of the Augusta Military Academy campus in Fort Defiance.

The President's Council

Those who contribute at least \$1,000 toward this project will become members of The President's Council. These contributors will have a special tour of the AMA Museum before it opens officially on Saturday 6 May 2000. They will also be invited to a special event at Reunion 2000 and will have a President's Council ribbon on their registration badges. Council



members also will receive quarterly reports on the progress of the restoration work. "The best way for us to start off our long dreamed about AMA Alumni House and Museum is to open it in the black," said Saunders. "I have been hearing from alumni these past few years who told me that they were ready to make substantial contributions when they knew that the museum was going to be a reality. We need you now to make good on those promises!"

1939

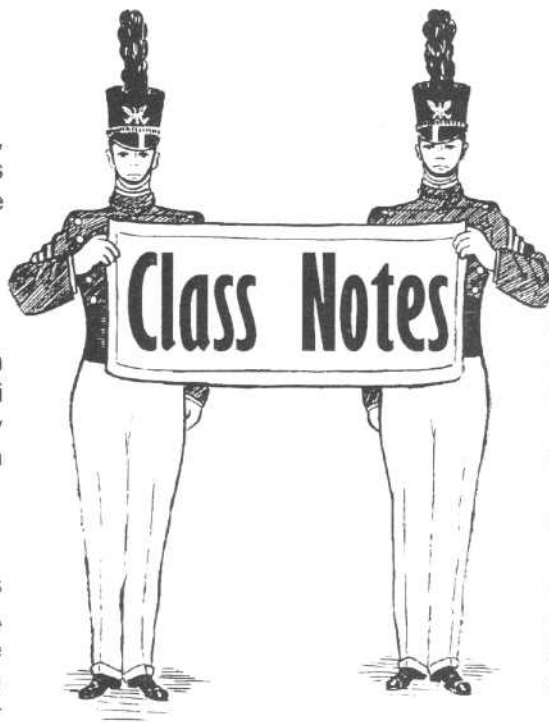

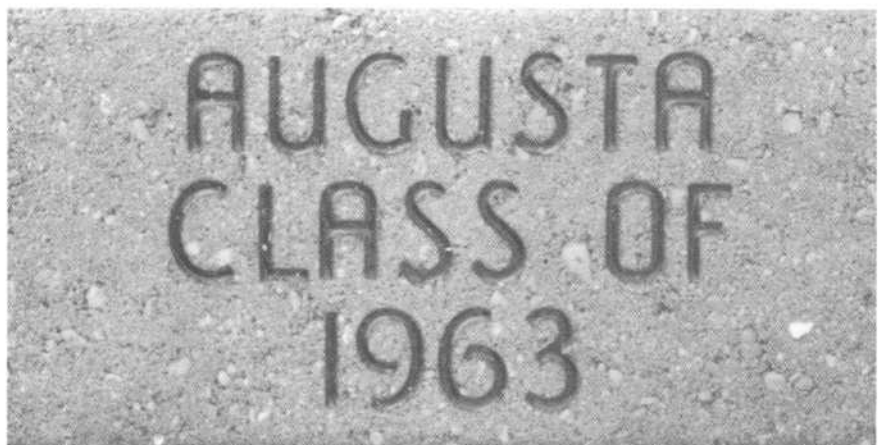
