Linda Roller Livick

September 7, 1936 - July 7, 2021

Linda (Roller) Livick, 84, wife of Malcolm Harris Livick, Sr., passed away peacefully Wednesday, July 7, 2021, surrounded by her family at her residence.

Linda was born September 7, 1936, in Augusta County, Virginia, a daughter of the late Charles S. Roller III and Linda (Todd) Roller Wales. She has lived most of her life in Fort Defiance.

Her family, for many generations, have worshiped at Augusta Stone Presbyterian Church. She was baptized there as an infant and has always taken an active part in the life of the church.

Linda's father was killed when she was eighteen months old and her grandparents, Charles and Janet Roller helped raise and educate her. She graduated from Stuart Hall School in Staunton, Virginia and was an Art/History Major at Converse College in Spartanburg, South Carolina. She taught art to the lower school at Augusta Military Academy for many years. Linda and her family owned and operated the Military school until it closed in 1984. She also was Alumnae Director at Stuart Hall for fourteen years.

Linda has been married to Malcolm H. Livick for nearly 65 years and is the mother of five children and grandmother to 13 grandchildren and was blessed with 26 great grandchildren. They have a son, Malcolm Livick, Jr., and wife, Martha, daughter, Lee Livick Combs, and husband, Frankie, and a son, Todd Livick, and wife, Andrea. Linda and Mal lost their youngest son, Taylor Livick, in 1994 and son, Charles Livick, in 2014 (and survived by his wife, Tracey).

Her husband, Mal, was the Superintendent of AMA for many years and later was an administrator at Blue Ridge Community College.

She was a life long member of Augusta Stone Presbyterian Church. She was an elder, a deacon, was a Sunday School teacher, Circle leader, church Historian, member of the Pastor Search Committee and flower arranger. She has served twice as the Moderator of the church PW and has been awarded the PW Life Membership. She was a moderator of Shenandoah Presbytery and a member of the Col Thomas Hughart Chapter of the DAR.

She was a member and past president of the Augusta Garden Club. She enjoyed cooking, gardening, painting, watching athletics, traveling, loves horses, and dogs and most of all, she loves being with her children, grandchildren, and great grandchildren.

Yes, she really cared very much for her AMA Cadets.

We have lost one of the last great living legacies of our beloved AMA. Linda Roller Livick was born and raised within yards of the AMA Campus and she is one of the reasons that we all remember and cherish our time spent there.

Linda Livick Roller was a Stuart Hall graduate and graduated in 1953. I was a 1973 graduate so this resulted in my reunion year overlapping with her year. Linda was our Alumni Director for many years and I am guessing retired in about 1998. I returned with Ron for the first couple of reunions and Linda and Mal took such an interest in him and asked after him without fail. The epitome of a Southern Lady and someone we should all try and emulate.

I met Linda initially as I attended dress parades and dances on AMA property and I knew she was an SH graduate. Linda asked me to be the class agent back in 1978 or so and I have been it ever since except with an occasional break now and then. Linda told me I was her best class agent and I have to assume it is true because Linda does not tell falsehoods. I am sure this is how we became good friends because if she asked me to do something, I gladly did it. In 1993 I was asked to serve on Stuart Hall's Alumnae Council. Since I lived in Cincinnati, this could have been a problem, but I was an airline employee so that made things a little easier to travel. I remember Linda sharing with me quietly that if I served on these boards/councils, I would be expected to make some nice gifts to Stuart Hall.

Looking back this amused me. I had just missed a huge capital campaign for building our Middle School and I feel sure Ron and I were in NO position to support it, but things changed.

When I would visit the Valley, I would always try to get on Linda and Mal's dance card. We had many meals together at the local eateries, we attended funerals together, Founder's Day at AMA, and AMA events, and we just had some jolly good times. She never had a mean word to say about anyone. She was always very gracious and she and Mal were like second parents to me. She never FORGOT my birthday. Her memory was phenomenal. I was afraid to say anything about anyone who lived in Virginia for fear they would be related to Linda or her family!!!

Her children, her grands and her great grands were very much a part of her life and then all of the cadets that she has known over the years. She was fond of all of them.

There is a room at our Alumni House named in honor of Linda Roller Livick. Monies were collected in her honor when the house was purchased and renovated. Initially our dear friend Boots Mason, who passed a few years ago, would always stay in the LRL room and Linda would ask me who was staying in "her room". If the house was crowded, I bunked in with Boots. Since Boots died, I stay there and Linda would get a big kick out of my telling her that I was staying in "her room". She will be greatly missed by our Stuart Hall community.

I know Linda was a member of the Augusta County Garden Club for over 50 years. She cherished this group of friends. She would tell me about the homes on the tour or what they were doing. There were occasions that I would send flowers to Linda and her family and I always let the florist know; she is a member of the Augusta County Garden Club and nothing shabby!!! Her thank you note/card/call would be very timely. Put me to shame.

She was, without a doubt, one of my dearest, loving friends.
