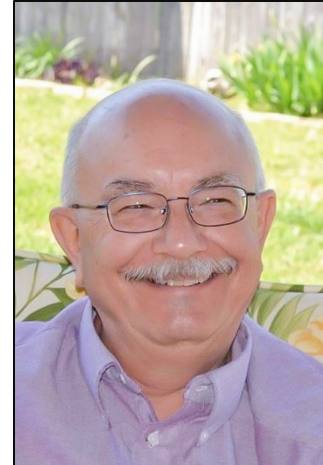

Now retired, B.J.'s lifetime of careers included retail lumber yard management, Christian bookstore bible and book buyer, and serving in many roles within the field of Information Technology. He finished his working time at Texas Tech University where he served 17 years as an I.T. Programmer/Analyst for several departments and in the Registrar's Office as Assistant Registrar for Technology, and Associate Registrar. He finished his tenure at Texas Tech University as a Data Analyst in the Graduate School where he predicted and monitored Graduate School enrollment.



Since being found on the internet and reconnected to AMA by former roommate Steve Pearson in 1996, B.J. has been active in the AMA community, developing and maintained our website, www.AMAalumni.org, at his own expense, and made available online AMA's history, many RECALLs, Bayonets, catalogs and photos from most events for the last 25 years.

Three years ago, B.J. became editor of the Bayonet, where his knowledge of modern software products and techniques has cut the cost of producing the Bayonet in half, sometimes more than half.

Currently, BJ is also heavily involved, along with Curator Rich vanBreemen, in consolidating our Museum Management software's alumnus information with B.J.'s Bayonet mailing list. These two are also in the process of mirroring many of the museum's exhibits on the website.

B.J. has been a member of the Foundation Board of Directors for three years, serving one year as Secretary. He looks forward to three more years of service to our AMA community of alumni.
